# Milestones Matter: A Guide for Families and Caregivers



### **Why Literacy Milestones Matter**

From birth to age five, a child's brain develops faster than at any other time in their life. Language and literacy skills grow through everyday moments like talking, singing, reading and playing.

Use this guide to track a child's literacy development, learn how to support them and know when to reach out for support. Remember, every child grows at their own pace. This is about progress, not perfection.

#### **Birth to 12 Months**

#### Your child might:

- Turn toward sounds or familiar voices
- Babble and coo
- Watch your face when you talk or sing
- · Explore books by looking, grabbing or mouthing

#### How to help:

- Talk and sing during everyday routines
- Read simple board books together
- Respond to sounds with smiles and words

#### Check with your pediatrician if:

• Baby doesn't respond to sounds or vocalize by 6–9 months

#### 1 to 2 Years

#### Your child might:

- Use simple words like "mama," "ball" or "bye"
- Point to pictures when named
- Recognize and enjoy favorite books or songs

#### How to help:

- · Talk often and name objects
- · Ask questions while reading
- Encourage pointing, repeating and labeling

#### Check with your pediatrician if:

- Fewer than 10–20 words
- Little interest in communication or books



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#### 2 to 3 Years

#### Your child might:

- Use short sentences like "want milk" or "go car"
- Retell parts of familiar stories
- · Pretend to read from memory

#### How to help:

- Repeat and expand their speech
- Read together every day
- Play with letter sounds and rhymes

#### Check with your pediatrician if:

- Speech is hard to understand
- Struggles to combine words



#### 3 to 4 Years

#### Your child might:

- · Tell stories with beginning, middle, and end
- Recognize letters and understand rhymes
- Know print has meaning

#### How to help:

- Play letter games and rhyming songs
- Let them "read" and tell their own stories
- Encourage questions and curiosity

#### Check with your pediatrician if:

- Difficulty understanding or expressing ideas
- Little interest in books or letters.



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#### 4 to 5 Years

#### Your child might:

- Recognize many letters and sounds
- Write their name or letters
- · Understand basic print concepts
- Retell full stories

#### How to help:

- Keep a daily reading routine
- · Encourage writing and drawing
- Ask open-ended questions about stories

#### Check with your pediatrician if:

- Can't follow stories or express thoughts clearly
- Has trouble remembering letters or sounds
